##### Artist: Keith Haring

**Significant Artwork:** Untitled (1987)



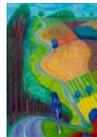
**Key Facts:**

- Much of his artwork includes figures.

##### Artist: David Hockney

**Movement:** Pop Art

**Significant Artwork:** Going Up Garrowby Hill (2000)



**Key Facts:**

- He is a famous British artist.
- He has made important contributions to Pop Art.
- He has a unique style and uses patterns and bold colours in graphic landscape paintings.

#### Technical Vocabulary

**Pop Art**

a style of art based on simple, bold images of everyday items, such as soup cans, painted in bright colours

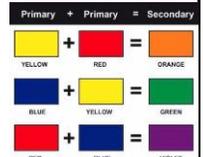
**primary colours**

a group of colours from which all other colours can be obtained by mixing



**secondary colours**

colours resulting from the mixing of two primary colours



**design**

an outline, sketch, or plan

**sketch**

a rough or unfinished drawing, often made to assist in making a more finished picture

**media**

the material used to create artwork

**mixed media**

a combination of different media or materials

**texture**

the feel or appearance of a surface

**figure**

the human form

**pattern**

a repeated decorative design

**technique**

the way tools and media are used to create artwork

**collage**

a piece of art made by sticking different materials such as photographs, pieces of paper or fabric on to a backing

**print**

the transfer of design to paper

**experiment**

try out new ideas or methods

**composition**

how lines, shapes and colours are positioned on a page
